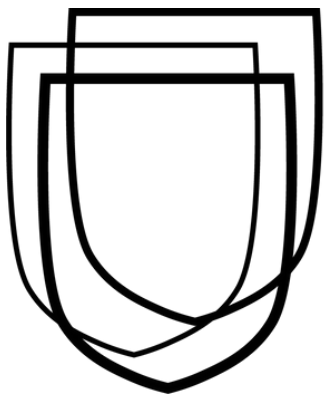

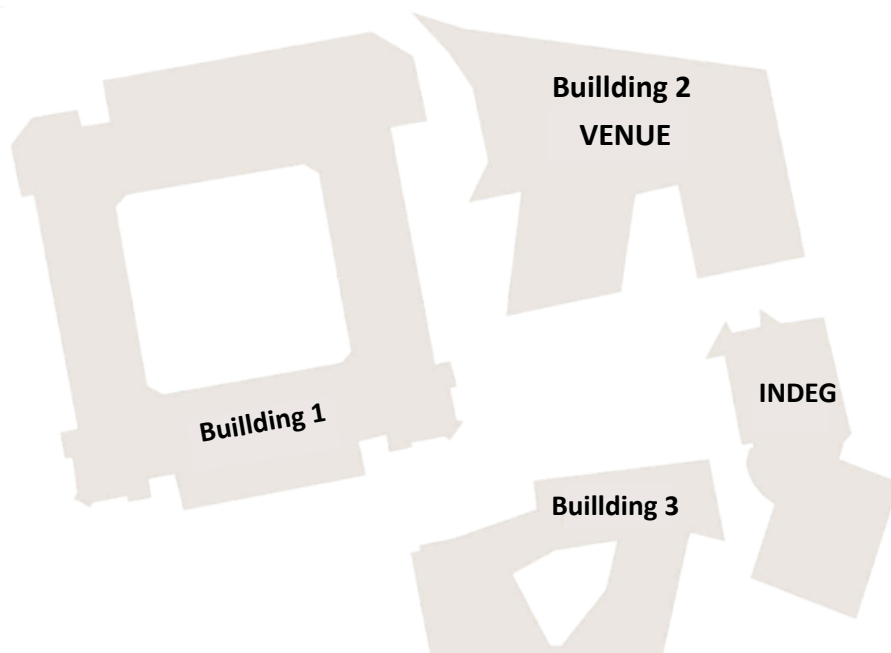
1. Connect to the Eventos1 Guest Access network
